

Honors Chamber Ensemble Guest Conductors



Dr. Thomas (Trey) Harris is the Associate Director of Bands for the School of Music. Dr. Harris began his professional musical career as a trombonist playing in the United States Marine Corps. He served in the III Marine Expeditionary Force Band (Okinawa, Japan) and Marine Forces Reserve Band (New Orleans, LA). After an honorable discharge from service, he studied music education at Michigan State University, receiving a B.M.E degree. While working on his degree, Harris maintained an active schedule as a freelance trombonist, private trombone/euphonium teacher, and band director. Upon graduation, he moved to the Midwest and pursued an M.M. degree at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, Conservatory of Music and Dance.

During his time in Kansas City, Harris consistently performed as a trombonist and conductor, holding the position of 2nd trombone in The Peoples' Liberation Big Band of Greater Kansas City. Receiving his M.M. in conducting in 2009 from UMKC, Harris continued his career as a public school band director achieving success with both middle school and high school bands in Missouri and Florida. In 2017, Harris graduated with his Ph.D. in Music Education from Florida State University.

An advocate for new music, Harris has participated in multiple consortia leading to original compositions for wind band. Most recently, he led a consortium for composer Adam Silverman. This resulted in a new work for upper high school/young college band called Raining Bricks in which Harris conducted the world premiere on April 12, 2018.

Dr. Harris served as Assistant Director of Bands at Kennesaw State University in Kennesaw, GA. In addition to his work with the bands at Kennesaw State, Harris also worked as guest conductor for the Georgia Brass Band during their NABBA Championship concert cycle. He maintains an active schedule as a trombonist, conductor, and clinician.



Dr. Bruce J. Uchimura is Professor of Music at Western Michigan University where he teaches cello and coaches chamber ensembles. He joined the faculty in the fall of 1987, having taught previously at the Augusta College Center for Creative Arts, Michigan State University, and the Preparatory and Adult Education department of the Cleveland Institute of Music. He served as Principal Cellist of the Augusta (Georgia) Symphony and was the first person ever to be named Associate Conductor of that ensemble. He also served as head of chamber music and member of the cello faculty at the legendary ENCORE School for Strings, under the directorship of David Cerone, from 1985-2007.

Uchimura received the Bachelor of Music degree from The Juilliard School of Music where he studied cello. He received the Master of Music degree with an Artists Diploma in Cello from the Cleveland Institute of Music where he studied cello. He has also studied at the Aspen Music Festival, the Meadowmount School of Music and the Banff School of Fine Arts, and he has held an orchestral fellowship at the Spoleto Festival.

As cellist of the celebrated Merling Trio for 30 years, Uchimura performed in 44 states, Europe, and Canada to broad critical acclaim. The trio performed 30-40 concerts yearly. With the trio, Uchimura has recorded for the Pamplin, Albany, MSR Classics, and Centaur labels

Uchimura's leadership as a conductor garnered wide recognition for the Western Michigan University Symphony Orchestra, which was named "Best Classical University Symphony Orchestra" in DownBeat magazine's 2005 national student music awards competition. In 2003, the Kalamazoo Gazette's classical music reviewer picked the orchestra's WMU centennial celebration concert as the most memorable performance of the year. The orchestra performed to much acclaim at the opening concert of the 2008 Michigan Music Conference in Grand Rapids, and has performed on music series around the state, such as the Community Arts Series in Hart, and the South Haven Performance Series.

Highly esteemed as a teacher, Mr. Uchimura was named 2010 Educator of the Year by the Michigan String Teachers Association. He actively supports music education in the state with numerous appearances as clinician and guest conductor, and serves as faculty advisor to the WMU student chapter of the American String Teachers Association, which was named "Best Student Chapter" in 2011.

MSBOA

The Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association (MSBOA) is a professional association of over 1,000 instrumental music teachers in Michigan Schools. Founded on a single-district basis in 1934, it has grown to a 16 regional-district association in both peninsulas, serving over 1,000 public, parochial and private schools.

Through numerous student-oriented activities such as festivals, workshops, and teacher in-service functions (district and state meetings, and clinics), the MSBOA strives to provide continual growth for instrumental music. For instance, each year over 100,000 students in Michigan participate in the MSBOA festivals, either individually or as a part of larger groups.

The growth of this association and higher musical standards of individuals and groups are evidence of progress - progress which is noted by others, both in and out of Michigan. Instrumental music is an integral part of the school curriculum in most schools in Michigan. The programs are popular, extremely visible and relatively economical.

Our Philosophy

The fine arts should be a vital part of the educational process. In a civilization stressing scientific achievement, material wealth, and specialization, the fine arts contribute greatly toward the maintenance of a proper cultural balance. As one of the areas of the fine arts, instrumental music contributes to the improvement of the quality of life of the individual. For many students, music is the most feasible and enjoyable means of communication available to them.
